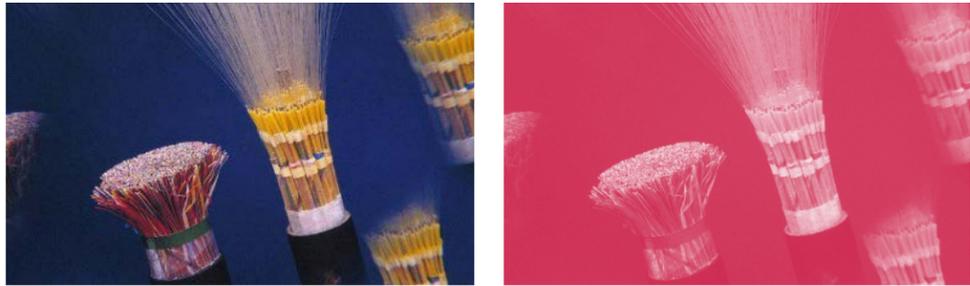

COLOR

THE MESSAGE,

In the mid 1800's the first telegram message was sent from Queen Victoria to President Buchanan via the Transatlantic cable. This cable was the first of its kind and lessened otherwise lengthy delivery times to about 10 days across the Atlantic ocean.
